### CGFM Profile:

### Certification Helps IT Professionals See the Big Picture

Norman Adkins hadn't worked for the National Institutes of Health for long before he started looking around for a way to learn more about managing finances within the government environment.

Adkins, 25, is Business Operations Specialist at the Division of Enterprise and Custom Applications at the NIH's Center for

Information Technology. "Basically, I'm responsible for financial management duties of an IT division at the NIH," he said. The division develops, manages and customizes software applications, and charges user fees for those and other services. "It's a lot like the private sector, but without the profit motive," Adkins said.

He came from the private sector where the Veterans Health Administration was one of his biggest clients. While that experience gave him a good background on government financial requirements, it wasn't enough.

Adkins said he wanted a broader base of knowledge — to learn about financial statements, the auditing process, performance reporting and more — and to grow professionally. An online search of

course offerings by Management Concepts led him to a description of the CGFM Training Series, which looked like the perfect combination.

Mitch Laine, an AGA Past National President and the former Deputy Chief Financial Officer at the U.S. Department of Education, taught all three courses. "It takes a special instructor to teach a semester's worth of courses in six days," Adkins said, adding that he benefited from the active participation and the real-life examples that complemented the course work.

Adkins' initial plan was to attend the three courses, which were paid for by his employer, without taking the next step of sitting for the three examinations. However, he was encouraged to obtain a new certification to add to his Project Management Professional credential. Adkins passed all three exams in November. "You don't want to underestimate any of the tests," he said. "They were a challenge."

Adkins said that as a Financial Manager, he's doing more than just managing resources; he's providing services to Project Managers. He makes it his responsibility to understand the programs so he can tailor services accordingly. "This certification provides me with the ability to better understand the

constraints they work under," he said. Project Managers often request data from Adkins, who said he can provide the information with more context now that he has a better understanding of the government environment.

Renee Edwards, Chief of the Custom Applications Branch, said Adkins' "big picture" perspective is one of the benefits of certification. Adkins interacts with managers throughout the entire life cycle of their projects to ensure costs are accurate, she said. "I consider him to be a stakeholder in the portfolio of projects the division manages."

Edwards said that by encouraging Adkins to pursue the CGFM, she hoped he would gain a better understanding of the terminology used by the Project Managers while enhancing his own skills. A wider range of knowledge and skills fits with the branch's strategic plan, which emphasizes improved project management and is a focus of the Office of Management and Budget.

Adkins said he is proud to be recognized as an expert in government financial management. "It's a complicated, broad field — and I have a ways to go to learn — but the peers that I support can trust that they can rely on my advice."

### **Away from Wall Street, Economists Question Basis of Paulson's Plan**

The Bush administration's pitch for a sweeping bailout of the financial system has centered on two simple premises: that the economy could suffer a crippling downturn if action is not taken very quickly and that this action should consist of the government buying troubled mortgage securities from banks and other

institutions. But many of the nation's top economists disagree with one or both of those ideas, even as many top political leaders have swung behind them. Wall Street economists have mostly endorsed Treasury Secretary Henry M. Paulson Jr.'s plan, or a variation thereof. But almost 200 academic economists—who aren't paid by the institutions that could directly benefit from the plan but who also may not have recent practical experience in the markets—have signed a petition organized by a University of Chicago professor objecting to the plan on the grounds that it could create perverse incentives, that it is too vague and *that its long-run effects are unclear.* —Neil Irwin and Cecilia Kang, *The Washington Post*. ### **U.S. Lawmakers Fault States for AIG Collapse**

State insurance regulators are angry that four members of Congress who support

federal oversight of the industry are blaming states in part for the collapse of insurance giant American International Group Inc., an event that escalated the financial crisis on Wall Street. "This is not a time for political opportunism," Joel Ario, Pennsylvania's insurance commissioner, said of the lawmakers. "I'm disappointed in the political chutzpah of some people." Connecticut Insurance Commissioner Thomas Sullivan said state insurance regulators, attending their annual fall meeting in the Washington, D.C., area on a range of issues including AIG, "were shocked" to read a Sept. 23 *Wall Street Journal* op-ed by U.S. Sens. John Sununu (R-NH) and Tim Johnson (D-ND) and U.S. Reps. Melissa Bean (D-IL) and Ed Royce (R-CA). The lawmakers wrote that the \$85 billion federal bailout of AIG was proof that Congress should approve their two-year-old legislation to strip states of their authority to regulate insurance companies. Instead, they propose that insurance companies have the option to choose a federal or state regulator. The proposal has split the insurance industry; large companies generally endorse it while small insurers generally oppose it. —Stephen C. Fehr, *Stateline.org*. [Read more.](#)

### **\$13 Billion in Iraq Aid Wasted or Stolen, Ex-Investigator Says**

A former Iraqi official has estimated that more than \$13 billion meant for reconstruction projects in Iraq was wasted or stolen through elaborate fraud schemes. Salam Adhoob, a former chief investigator for Iraq's Commission on Public Integrity, last Monday told the Senate Democratic Policy Committee, an arm of the Democratic caucus, that an Iraqi auditing bureau "could not properly account for" the money. While many of the projects audited "were not needed—and many were never built," he said, "this very real fact remains: Billions of American dollars that paid for these projects are now gone." He said a report that went to Iraqi Prime Minister Nouri al-Maliki and other top Iraqi officials was never published

because "nobody cares" about investigating such cases. Many investigators, he said, feared for their safety because 32 of his co-workers have been murdered. Adhoob said he reported the abuses to the U.S. Special Inspector General for Iraq Reconstruction, an agency charged by Congress with helping to root out cases of waste, fraud and abuse in the nearly \$50 billion U.S. reconstruction effort. —Dana Hedgpeth, *The Washington Post*. ### **Obama Reform Plan Bears Traces of Clinton, Bush Efforts**

While much of Illinois Sen. Barack Obama's management reform agenda echoes the Clinton-Gore theme of reinventing government, a Bush administration-like focus on performance is likely to remain a high priority, observers say. The Democratic presidential nominee's renewal in Green Bay,

Wis., of a pledge to make federal programs "work better and cost less" jogged the memories of some Washington management insiders. "That phrase—'make government work better and cost less'—that was the National Performance Review slogan, which I coined," said David Osborne, former senior adviser to Clinton Vice President Al Gore on the reinventing government task force. "The fact that they're using that is a message that they're harkening back to the Clinton stuff." Osborne serves on Obama's government reform advisory committee. John Kamensky, former deputy director of Gore's National Performance Review, said Obama's proposal to cut middle managers and reallocate staff to the front lines rang "reinventing government *bells ... It's clearly an NPR issue.*" Kamensky and Osborne both said, however, that Obama's plan seems to draw on elements of the Bush administration's management agenda as well, particularly in terms of performance measurement. —Elizabeth Newell and Robert Brodsky, *Government Executive*. ### **Deal Clears Way for Bill Giving IGs Greater Independence**

House and Senate negotiators and the White House have reached agreement on a bill intended to increase the independence of inspectors general, clearing the way for probable passage of the measure before Congress adjourns. "It's on the precipice of succeeding," said a spokeswoman for Senate Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs Committee Chairman Joseph Lieberman, I-CT, one of the bill's backers. Agreement on the bill follows months of discussions aimed at reconciling a stronger House bill with a Senate measure while heading off opposition from the White House and some Senate Republicans. Talks picked up in recent weeks, with the House largely accepting

several tweaks in the Senate bill aimed at the addressing White House concerns, aides said. The bill was first drafted by Rep. Jim Cooper, D-TN, who has pushed it for years. The final bill omits a provision backed by House Judiciary Committee Chairman John Conyers, D-MI, that would have shifted certain responsibilities for overseeing Justice Department lawyers from the department's

Office of Professional Responsibility to the inspector general's office. Conyers has backed Justice IG Glenn Fine's assertion that his office is better suited for those tasks because it is independent from the department, but Republicans opposed the measure. — Dan Friedman, *CongressDaily*.
